IV. Activities

1. Life skill for OVC

1.1. English Class

Two German volunteers from Germany and one Khmer counterpart are teaching the children with support from the DED. They are teaching English utilizing speaking, drawing, games and songs as well as listening comprehension. Both of them are planning to teach all the children to read and write until the second quarter of 2011. The children were provided with notebooks as well as lesson books by DED funds. In addition, cultural exchange is practiced: The children teach the volunteers about Cambodia while thus learning about their own culture and the volunteers teach western customs. They also encouraged them to browse the library for story pictures and Khmer stories with English aspects. School materials like white board markers, water colours, crayons, and colour pencil are provided by the German volunteer teachers. There are two classes per day with 23 male and 25 female students (total 48 students) in 2010. Nowadays, a lot of children regularly attend the classes, which makes the learning more effective.

All OVCs' participating in MKK may furthermore attend BSDA's English classes at Angkor Primary school near the office. There are 561 students being taught in the informal education program of BSDA, 294 girls and 267 boys. This number includes the MKK students (MKK kids can learn English for free). Other students outside MKK have to pay for classes at only 50% to 60% of the current cost of Private English School in
